DEAR FRIENDS,

At the end of another successful fiscal year, we want to take a moment to thank everyone who makes our success possible—our dedicated volunteers, our generous donors, our committed staff, and our caring community. We are proud to report that CASA is making a difference in the lives of kids in crisis in our community. In fiscal year 2022, our CASA Volunteers advocated for 622 children involved in 352 abuse and neglect cases in the 17th Colorado Judicial District. Once again, the number of cases served by CASA Volunteers increased, and we continue to be one of the largest serving programs in Colorado.

We believe whole-heartedly that the advocacy of our CASA Volunteers truly does impact the lives of the children we serve. Research supports that idea-protective factors such as consistent and caring adults and tangible support during times of need have been found to counter the effects of adverse childhood experiences and increase children's resilience, educational success, health, and overall well-being long-term. We know that CASA Volunteers are these consistent and caring adults to many children in the child welfare system. Patty Silverstein, a well-known Colorado economist and President of Development Research Partners, considered all the supportive activities of CASA Volunteers when she conducted an analysis of the social impact of CASA. She concluded that as CASA Volunteers advocate for and support positive outcomes, this has the impact of reducing lifetime social costs and increasing lifetime earnings for the children served, which results in improving Colorado's communities and business environment.

Our community partners recognize the strong value that CASA brings to the community. Along with their recognition, they continue to invest in our mission to provide advocacy for every child in need who has experienced abuse and neglect. As an example, with a portion of their allotment of federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, Adams County is supporting non-profits doing crucial work to lift all community members. We are pleased to be a grantee of the Adams County COVID-19 Grant Program.

We are also keenly aware that sustainable funding is necessary to maintain and further enhance program growth. Our CASA Program, in conjunction with the Colorado CASA network and local legislators, is exploring options for sustainable funding. State Representative Shannon Bird continues to be a CASA champion in these efforts, and we appreciate her support as we move forward to create sustainable and ongoing funding for organizations such as CASA that support children in crisis. We are excited to report that the push will continue in the next legislative session as CASA works with community leaders to develop a feasibly sound plan.

With the opportunities created through ARPA one-time funding and potential sustainable funding, we acknowledge that our work can continue only with the unwavering support of our CASA Volunteers, donors, and all our stakeholders. Because the advocacy of a CASA Volunteer can truly change the trajectory for the children they serve, all those engaged with our program impact the lives of these children, their families, and the community as a whole. Thank you for your role in furthering our mission to provide high quality advocacy services for children in our community so they have an opportunity to thrive!

DEMOGRAPHICS OF CHILDREN SERVED









YEAR IN REVIEW




TOTAL REVENUE




ARPA FUNDING

Many thanks to Adams County for investing in our children and recognizing that when all children have an opportunity to thrive, the community thrives!






THE PEER COORDINATOR MODEL

Since 2014, the Peer Coordinator Program has grown year over year, helping us move closer to our goal of providing court-appointed volunteer advocacy for every child in need in Adams & Broomfield Counties.

Peer Coordinators are experienced, specially trained volunteers who step into a supervisory role. They draw on their own experience as a CASA Volunteer to provide support and guidance to their CASA Volunteers; offering resources and problem-solving issues as they arise. In 2014, the Peer Coordinator Program began with 5 Peer Coordinators, and this fiscal year, grew to 19 Peer Coordinators. These leaders supported 111 CASA Volunteers serving on 141 cases, who advocated for 257 children.

Our Peer Coordinators are integral to the future of our program because they allow us to grow without incurring the exponential costs that would typically be associated with serving more children. We are so grateful for their dedication to our program, our volunteers, and the children with whom we work.



PAM WHITE

had been a CASA Volunteer just shy of two years when she was approached to become a Peer Coordinator. She was more than happy to take on the extra responsibility.

She wanted to do more to be of service to the children and youth served by CASA. Her motivation to give so generously of her time comes from the realization that not every child shares her experience of growing up in a loving and safe home.

Since becoming a Peer Coordinator, she has seen first-hand the benefit of this model. Pam believes the Peer Coordinator model not only helps CASA serve more children and families, but also creates a larger support system for CASA Volunteers. With more support and resources on hand, the more detail-oriented staff and volunteers can be. "The more we notice, the more we can help," she said.

STRENGTHENING FAMILIES

Charles and Erin Keyes (2021 CASA Volunteers of the Year) were sworn-in as CASA Volunteers in January 2020 and took their first case just a few days later. Compelled by the belief that children are the future and the desire to impact that future for the better, Charles and Erin are passionate, dedicated, and willing to go above and beyond for the children they serve. This became quickly apparent as they advocated for three young children on their first case.

When the case opened, the father and mother were struggling with substance abuse, which contributed to an unsafe environment for the children. With other relatives in the home, the children were able to remain there. As human services got involved, the father committed to treatment and providing a safe and loving home for his children. As CASA Volunteers, Charles and Erin understood their role was to be invested in the children, looking out for them, ensuring that their needs were being met and that they were healthy and safe.

However, they also realized that advocating for children to thrive means supporting their caregivers to be successful. When the father found out that Charles and Erin were assigned to the case, he admits he was skeptical of someone else who would tell them what to do. He did not expect them to be so loving and caring, and he quickly discovered they were committed to supporting and strengthening his entire family.

As Charles and Erin cultivated a relationship with the children, always bringing activities on their visits to engage with them and make them feel comfortable, they also became a vital resource for the family as a whole. They helped research daycare options so that the father could work full-time. Once the mother began her treatment plan, they supported the father in ensuring that her visits with the children were safe and appropriate. They went to a local food bank to secure much-needed supplies for the family. And during the pandemic shutdown, even though they could not visit in the same way, they frequently dropped off food and other items and visited from a safe distance.

The case ended with the family reunited and the parents regaining full custody of their three small children. At case closing the judge commended the parents for their hard work and dedication and recognized Charles and Erin for their commitment that helped change the trajectory not just for the children, but for the entire family. The father asked Charles and Erin to stay in touch with his family, noting that these CASA Volunteers "have been one of the best, most positive things in my life and my children's especially."

RECURRING DONORS

Dozens of agencies ask us for donations, but with CASA, we can watch our giving put to use right in front of us as we see the program grow. We want to see every child in the system benefit from a CASA - but we have a long way to go. That's why we volunteer for Indulge and other events, why we urge others to give, and why we doubled our monthly contribution this year.

Mark McCulley Recurring Donor

Recurring donors are part of the fabric of our organization, playing a direct role in reaching long-term goals and advancing the CASA mission. Monthly donors are foundational, as their monthly gift provides a consistent revenue stream and sustains our CASA Program.

For our donors, a recurring donation is convenient, spreading their gift across the year with no need to renew. For CASA, recurring donations allow us to plan out financial resources throughout the year so we can continue to serve the children in our community.

Bob Lembke is a long-time CASA supporter and issued a \$100,000 year-end match to the CASA network. This challenged our donor base to step up like never before, raising more than \$200,000 and allowing us to change the lives of more than 165 children in Adams and Broomfield Counties. Over the past 10 years, Bob's direct generosity has provided advocacy for more than 360 children in our community, which will influence generations to come.
